What to do with your unused embryos?

A guide for sorting through the options.

Many couples who choose in vitro fertilization (IVF) create more embryos than they finally use to build their family. Remaining embryos are in frozen storage. But now your family is happily completed and you are faced with an important decision: What will you do with these embryos?

We know this decision is deeply personal, requiring careful consideration. We invite you to work through this guide to help you sort through your feelings about the choices available to you. Writing things down can help clarify your thoughts and help you reach the best decision for you and your partner. You both may want to print and complete the form separately and then discuss your thoughts together.

We hope you will find this 4-Step guide useful.

Step 1 Complete the four tables, each focused on one of the disposition choices available to you.

- What are the pros and cons for each option? If you can think of other pros or cons, please add these to your table matrix.
- How important is each pro or con to you? You may like to rate each one, 0 − 5, with 0 being not important and 5 begin extremely important.
